Coronavirus Procedures Information

We are following the Re-Opening Guidelines established by the Governor's Taskforce on Re-Opening in conjunction with the Ohio Optometric Association. Some procedures in the office have changed due to the coronavirus outbreak. **SOME KEY POINTS** are noted below:

- Everyone who comes into the office will need to be **wearing a mask that covers the mouth and nose.** (That is not just true in optometry offices, but also in many other businesses that have a close interaction with members of the public.)
- If you have a **cold, the flu, or any other respiratory infection or any fever,** you will need to wait for an appointment until you are **completely over the infection** before we can schedule you.
- We are doing a great deal of office cleaning before we see patients in the morning and throughout the day.
- We can dispense contact lenses at curbside or at the front door. We can also have contact lenses shipped to your house by taking your credit card information over the phone.

SOME IMPORTANT SUGGESTIONS that will be helpful while we are dealing with the pandemic include:

- If you want to **schedule an appointment** for an eye exam or office visit, please **call the office** rather than coming to the office.
- If you are having a **medical eye problem,** please **call the office to schedule an appointment** rather than coming to the office.
- If you are **paying a medical visit bill,** please **send the payment in the enclosed envelope** provided rather than coming to the office.
- If you have **questions** about something, please **call the office.** The staff will do the best they can to help you with that, and if necessary, the doctor will call you back.
- If your **frame is broken** and still under warranty (within a year) **call the office.** We can usually figure out over the phone if we need to order a new part or not and get it ordered before you need to come in.

A Special Note for Contact Lens Wearers:



We fit the latest in contact lenses for high oxygen permeability and good wettability. However, for some patients who have developed sensitivities to deposits on contact lenses and some components of contact lens solutions, the only comfortable way to wear contact lenses is daily disposable contact lenses which we also fit.

When we do contact lens fittings or re-fittings in our office, we always have the patient try several of the latest types of contact lenses. This is important, as it allows the patient to find out which lens is most comfortable for them personally. There is no one best lens for everyone, despite the ads you may see on TV from some of the contact lens companies. What is most comfortable for one person is not comfortable for all people.

Are you aware we have several budget-friendly frame packages? Our labs have put together a combined frame and lens package in 5 options to meet your needs.

Affordable Vision Plan starts at \$55 for single vision. The **Choice Plan** starts at \$45 for single vision, and the **Value Plan** starts at \$92 for single vision.

Additional plan options include Progressive (no-line bifocal), Transitions which change in the sun, Polarized, and Anti-Reflective Coating.

The **Lookouts** package for kids starts at \$115. The **Progear Eyeguard Sports** package is available for \$155. Lookout plan options include Transitions and two-sided scratch coating (single sided is included).

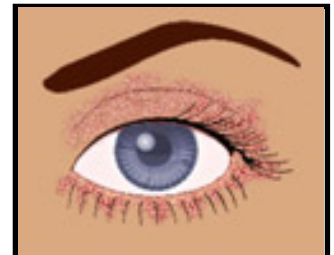
These frame packages come with a one-year warranty on lenses and frames against manufacturer's defect.

We also have a **safety frame** program starting at \$56 for single vision. Options include Progressive, Transitions, UV and Anti-Reflective coatings, and solid tints. They come with detachable or permanent side-shields.

Focus On: Blepharitis

Blepharitis is a low grade infection or inflammation of the oil glands in the upper and lower eyelids. Most cases are chronic, meaning they have been present for a long period of time. A few cases are acute, meaning they came on suddenly. For chronic blepharitis, eyelid hygiene is very important. This means soaking and then washing the eyelids. This can be done in the shower or while standing at the sink. Medical treatment may include antibiotics or antibiotics with steroids if the cause seems to be mostly bacterial. In recent years, it has become known that skin mites (demodex) are responsible for some cases of chronic blepharitis that have not responded to antibiotics. Fortunately, new treatments are available for blepharitis caused by skin mites.

Untreated blepharitis can cause many other eyelid and eye related problems. Blepharitis is a common cause of dry eye conditions due to the fact that the oil glands that are infected in blepharitis are the glands that produce the oil layer of the tears. The oil layer of the tears is the top layer of the tears, and one of its functions is to keep the watery layer of the tears from evaporating. Other common problems produced by blepharitis include styes, chalazia, conjunctivitis, keratitis (inflammation of the cornea), loss of eye lashes, and in-turning of eyelashes which then rub on the eye. That is known as trichiasis. It is better to treat blepharitis before some of these secondary problems develop.



Blepharitis

is an inflammation of the eyelids and eyelashes. It causes red, irritated, itchy eyelids and dandruff-like scales on eyelashes.

Handicap Accessibility and Our Office

We have long had a wheelchair ramp on the north end of our building. Some patients are still not familiar with that fact, since it is at ground level and not very visible from the street. In recent years, we finished replacing sidewalk sections in front of our office to make the whole area very smooth. We had found that some of our mobility-impaired patients still preferred coming in the front door, so this should make it easier for them getting out and back to their cars.



NEW OPTOMETRIC EQUIPMENT IN 2020 AT KENTON VISION CARE

In July we purchased a computerized vision chart to replace the standard projector eyechart. The computerized eyechart has a higher contrast between the letters and the background. It also has multiple other eyecharts besides letters including numbers, picture figures for preschool age children, contrast sensitivity testing for certain medical eye conditions, color vision testing, and depth perception testing.

Did You Know?

- 80% of learning is through vision

Non-Ocular Health Disorders We Have Detected During Eye Exams

- high blood pressure
- high cholesterol
- diabetes
- acne rosacea
- post stroke
- carotid artery occlusion
- stroke
- defective heart valve
- pseudo-tumor cerebri (idiopathic intracranial hypertension)
- multiple sclerosis
- brain tumor

1. The eyes are not isolated from the rest of the body. The eyes are connected to the rest of the body through:
 - ◇ the circulatory system
 - ◇ the hormonal system
 - ◇ the nervous system—the optic nerve is a tract (extension) of the brain.
2. An “eye exam” is not just an examination of the eyes. It is also an examination of the circulatory system and nervous system. The eyes are the only structures in the body where you can see both the circulatory system and the nervous system. These systems can be examined non-invasively with the dilated internal exam and/or visual field testing.
3. Some of these conditions were symptomatic and some were not, when they were found. In cases where the problems were symptomatic, the patients thought the problem was only with their eyes.
4. In an eye exam, we may not find the non-ocular disorder itself, but we find evidence of it.
